



Most Important Youth, Education and Child Welfare Issues





Most Important Public Safety and Emergency Services Issues





Most Important Core Infrastructure, City Services and Resiliency Issues





Most Important Housing, Economic Development and Land Use Issues



















Community Feedback - East Harlem Earth Day Conference



On a midday in early August, that disparity became glaring when The New York Times used an infrared thermometer to record surface temperatures on Manhattan's Upper West Side, as well as in East Harlem and the South Bronx.

On the tree-canopied block of West 94th Street near Central Park in Manhattan, the sidewalk temperature was 84.

Just across town, at a treeless lot for sanitation trucks on First Avenue in East Harlem, the blacktop registered at 115 degrees, a full 31 degrees hotter.








The green litter basket had stood on a street corner in Harlem for as long as anyone could remember, collecting unwanted plastic bottles, candy wrappers and crumpled bags and papers.

On UES, one intersection can have up to 12 baskets...whereas many are missing in Harlem




VISION PLAN

The East Harlem Resiliency Study was undertaken by NYC Parks and the Mayor's Office of Resiliency in order to develop a vision plan for a climate-resilient East Harlem.

The effort was funded through the City's post-Sandy Disaster Recovery (HUD CDBG-DR) funds. The City proactively dedicated funds from general Planning dollars to East Harlem because not all storms and climate risks will hit waterfront neighborhoods the way Sandy did.

The Vision Plan was released and has been publicly available since December 2019.

Parks and MOR presented the final Vision Plan to CB11 in January 2020.








Vision for a Resilient East Harlem: Planning Framework
